LuAnn Stuver Rogers nominated for Maxwell Medallion

Former Record-Courier columnist LuAnn Stuver Rogers of Ravenna has been nominated by the Dog Writers Association of America for a prestigious Maxwell Medallion for Excellence.

The nomination is for her "From the Heart" column in the quarterly magazine "The Royal Dispatch," the award-winning national publication for the American Cavalier King Charles Spaniel Club. Winners were announced and medallions presented at the annual awards banquet being held in New York City in conjunction with the Westminster Dog Show in February.

Rogers, a founding member of the Love on a Leash program at Robinson Memorial Hospital, writes the column in her position as national therapy chair for the ACKCSC.

Her "Dog Tales" column appeared in the Record-Courier from February 2000 through November 2008.

The Maxwell Medallion is named for Maxwell Riddle, a past president of the DWAA and a Ravenna native, who was, during his lifetime, became known as an international authority on dogs.

Riddle worked for 35 years for the Cleveland Press as a feature writer and reporter. His syndicated dog column ran for 30 years. In addition he authored more than a dozen books on dogs. He was the founder of Ravenna Kennel Club and served as its president for 47 years.

He was an American Kennel Club judge and judged dog shows throughout the world, including in Japan and South America. He also wrote a column for "Dog World" magazine that ran for 50 years. He died in 2002.

"This nomination is particularly meaningful for me since Max was a friend and mentor in my early writing career," Rogers said. "In fact, one of my favorite notes from readers of "Dog Tales" came from a woman who wrote, "I think, with time, you could write a dog column for the R-C as good as Max's column in the Cleveland Press! Write from your heart and keep the humor going!"

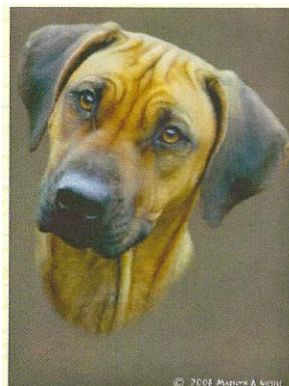

To all Agility enthusiasts!

A new session is coming up and right now is a good time to call Nancy V. to sign your dog up for the next session. For the Jan - Feb session, we were slightly overwhelmed by the amount of dog and handler teams in some of the classes, and though we are thrilled by so many people wanting to play agility with their dogs, our goal is to provide quality instruction to all of you. For the March - April session we have therefor made some changes.

First of all, right now we have instructors for all classes that are scheduled, but we are not enrolling more than 8 dogs in any class with only one instructor. If we have an assistant, we will try to accommodate 12. When you are signing up, please try to enroll in the correct class. You can refer to our website for class descriptions but here is a short summary:

- **Intro and Beginner** classes are to teach your dog to do all the obstacles correctly, and without fear. Focus, attention and recall are also part of the curriculum.
- **Agility 1** will start short sequencing, but mainly focus on mastering weaves and contacts. (Please be aware that most dogs will repeat this class at least once unless you do a lot of work at home.)
- **Agility 2** is for dogs that are ready to start competing or are competing in Novice AKC or equivalent,
- **Agility 3** is where your dog belongs when they have earned that Novice title (i.e. competing in Open), and
- **Advanced Agility** is for dogs competing in the Excellent division.

There will actually be 3 Intro classes starting the first Monday in March; One in the daytime and 2 at night. If you or anyone you know is interested in assisting, we would love to hear from you. Even if you are willing to be a "Stand-by" instructor or assistant, to fill in when someone needs a day off, please let us know. Normally Lynda Tushar does the instructor sign-up, but she is on vacation until the end of February, so you can let me know instead.

I hope this will help in getting everyone into the correct class!

Dog Afraid of Vet Visits?

"That's it, I'm never taking Astro to the vet again!" a friend of mine recently vowed. She went on to explain why. "First, he was all excited for our adventure together. He even bounded out of the car when we got to the vet's office and was prancing along. But as soon as he caught a whiff of the other animals, he came to a grinding halt and wouldn't budge. I had no shot at getting my 97 pound beast in the door."

Sound familiar? Don't give up. Getting your pet used to having routine check-ups from an early age is important to his long-term health. Here are some techniques that I shared with my friend on how to make her pooch's healthcare less stressful.

Pay a Social Visit

Swing by the vet's office, say hi, and spend a little time. The staff understands that dogs aren't always thrilled about vet's visits and may need extra help getting comfortable with the surroundings. Plus, everyone prefers treating calm, well-adjusted dogs to ones that need to be forcefully restrained. By making the social visits fun, your dog will begin to realize that trips to the vet don't always involve poking and prodding.

Look Him Over

Ask your vet to show you a few basic handling techniques that you can practice on your pooch at home, minus the medical props. Then, about once a week, gently check him over as your vet instructed. Be sure to praise him along the way for his cooperation, and give him treats once you're done. You can also try doing this during your social stops at the vet if the office doesn't mind and there's an empty room you can practice in.

Set a Calm Example

Anticipating a dog having a major meltdown at the vet's can shake up even the calmest dog owners. And your pooch can sense your emotions. So take a few deep breaths to steady yourself so you can talk to your pet in a relaxed, reassuring tone. If possible, go into the examining room with him. With you rather than a vet staffer restraining him, your pup might relax more and resist less.

Seek Help

If your dog gets seriously panicky or becomes aggressive with the vet staff, you may need professional help. Some owners find that giving their dog a sedative before appointments makes the whole experience easier for everyone. In any case, you'll need to discuss your dog's struggles with your vet to help determine the best approach for easing his fears.

American Kennel Club Launches New Coursing Ability Test

-- New Test Allows All Dogs the Chance to Experience the Fun and Excitement of Lure Coursing --

New York, NY — The American Kennel Club® (AKC®) is pleased to announce the launch of a new titling event – the Coursing Ability Test – on February 24, 2011 in Calhoun, GA. Open to all dogs, the Coursing Ability Test is an introductory event fashioned after the sport of lure coursing and meant to be a fun, healthy activity for dogs and their owners. Coursing Ability Tests may be held by all licensed lure coursing clubs. Eligible dogs must be at least 12 months of age and individually registered/listed with the AKC (registered purebred, Foundation Stock Service (FSS), Purebred Alternative Listing (PAL) or AKC Canine Partner). In order to pass the test, a dog running alone must pursue a lure, completing the course with enthusiasm and without interruption within a given time.

“The Coursing Ability Test can provide a wonderful community outreach opportunity, an enjoyable experience for dogs and owners and a way to expose a wider audience to the sport,” said AVP Performance Events Doug Ljungren. “Most dogs will chase a lure and have fun in the process.”

Dogs that pass the Coursing Ability Test three times will earn a Coursing Ability (CA) title. Ten passes and a dog earn a Coursing Ability Advanced (CAA) title and 25 passes results in a Coursing Ability Excellent (CAX) title.

Agility 'Time 2 Beat' Titling Class Launches

-- AKC's Fastest Growing Sport Adds Fastest New Class --

The American Kennel Club continues with innovations in the sport of Agility by offering new opportunities for exhibitors with the launch of the Time 2 Beat (T2B) Titling Class. It's the most interactive class to date where the most accurate, quickest dog sets the pace and all levels – Novice, Open and Excellent – compete against each other on the same course.

This new optional class for clubs, most recently tested by more than 5,000 dogs which ran courses nationwide as a special attraction, has proven it's a fun way to test a handler/dog team's speed and accuracy. All AKC clubs licensed to hold Agility Trials may immediately apply to hold this exciting new class or add it to events already submitted for approval. Clubs can continue to offer the classes as a special attraction prior to the **effective date of July 1, 2011**.

"What makes this class so unique and engaging is that the fastest dog in each jump height sets the "Time to Beat" during the competition," said AKC Director of Agility Carrie DeYoung. "In conjunction with the AKC Agility Advisory Committee, we really listened to our exhibitors and clubs and developed this exciting class with them in mind."

Courses will be built with obstacles from Jumpers With Weaves, with the option of having one to two contacts included on the course. The setting of the time by exhibitors is different than the current AKC classes (Standard and JWW) where the Standard Course Time (SCT) is set by the course yardage as wheeled by the judge.

The class may be offered as Regular and Preferred once per day as an additional class at a club's option. This is beneficial to clubs which can add an additional class without making multiple course changes that add time to the day as well as increase entries.

To earn the T2B (Regular) or T2BP (Preferred) title, a dog must earn 15 qualifying scores and 100 points. The T2B title initials will be followed by a numeric designation indicating the number of times the dog has met the requirements of the T2B title. Each time a dog earns the T2B title the number of qualifying scores and points will be reset to zero.

How to Pay for Unexpected Vet Expenses

Injuries, surprise surgeries, or unexpected illnesses, can leave you with some pretty hefty out-of-the-blue vet bills. This can be troubling for anyone, especially given the current state of the economy. If worrying about your ability to cover such unexpected expenses has you tossing and turning all night, don't despair. A little planning can help you secure some financial aid so you can afford all of the care your much-loved pup might need.

- **Consider pet insurance.** Although it requires making small but continual payments, having pet insurance could help soften the blow of bigger vet bills down the road.
- **Be honest with your vet.** Let him or her know that you're having trouble making ends meet, and ask if he or she would be willing to work out a payment plan to help you get your bills paid off. See if there is a monthly amount you could pay that would work for both of you.
- **Talk to some other vets.** Although it will probably cost you a consultation fee, it might be worth it to get a second opinion -- or even a third -- before committing to expensive services or procedures.
- **Visit a vet school.** Many schools operate clinics that provide services at discounted rates, so check around to see if there is one anywhere near you.
- **Check with your local shelter.** Their staff might be able to recommend subsidized vet clinics or other programs that can offer assistance. Also, check with the Humane Society of the United States for other available resources.

Dog Urine Odor Removal in 4 Steps

Discover how to effectively nix the odor of dog urine right after accidents.

Accidents happen. It's part of life with pooches. But as the mama of my favorite Japanese spitz, Gucci, says, "A little pee on the tile or hardwood isn't a big deal, but why does he always go on the carpet?!" Frustrating, I know. Makes cleanup way more of a hassle. Plus, you have to worry about lingering odors. If your dog catches a whiff of past piddles, it's likely that he'll go there again the next time he can't hold it. Here's what I recommend to zap accident odors:

1. **Act quickly.** It's best to clean up accidents as soon as possible, so they have less chance to soak in. For fresh puddles on your carpet, soak them up with plenty of paper towels until the area is almost completely dry. Then, rinse the area with cool water and blot.
2. **Add some muscle, if needed.** If the puddle's been sitting around, and a stain is already starting to set, a wet vac, shop vac, or similar type of extractor cleaning machine is your best bet. It works by rinsing the affected area with water and forcefully sucking it away. You can rent or buy one, but don't confuse it with a steam cleaner, whose high heat actually helps set stains and allows odors to penetrate more deeply.

Resist the urge to add any other chemicals or cleaning products to this machine; it uses only water. Also, stronger smelling cleaning products don't necessarily do a better job of getting rid of odors. In fact, dogs can usually still detect their own scent soon after the cleaning fumes have subsided and will likely be drawn back to that spot.
3. **Neutralize.** Once the area is clean, use a neutralizing product to tackle any lingering odors. Most pet stores stock a variety. You want the neutralizer to work directly on the carpet and not waste any of its power interacting with other products, so make sure anything else that you've applied to the carpet has been thoroughly rinsed. Before applying to the accident area, spot test the neutralizer on a tiny, hidden section of carpet to make sure it works agreeably.

Replace, if needed.
